

From the Schoolmaster

The Origin of Expression – Knowing our History and Staying Relevant!

Every now and then you hear someone use an expression from the past to try and get their point across. While an older expression may still be relevant to some, others (usually the younger generation) may not recognise what the expression is actually referring to; historically speaking that is.

If someone said "he flies off the handle for nothing" most would likely know the meaning; that the person is about to lose their self control. However, how many would know that to "*fly off the handle*" is a figurative reference eluding to the uncontrollable way a loose axe-head can fly off from its handle. This expression goes back to the beginning of the nineteenth century when pioneers were using axes as often as people use computers today.

Another expression that was commonly used in days past was "A stitch in time saves nine". Saves nine what you might wonder? The 'stitch in time' is simply the sewing up of a small hole or tear in a piece of material, so saving the need for more stitching at a later date when the hole has become larger. Clearly, the users of this expression historically would have been referring to saving nine stitches.

Expressions lose their potency when people no longer understand their origins. Especially, when people don't relate to or know what they are meant to be referring to. We don't use axes very often or even stitch for that matter anymore – at least by hand, when every stitch is an effort.

It reminds me of something I heard recently that made me smile. A reference was made to "taping" a good show on television and someone had no idea what they were talking about since they had only ever known digital tv. If they never knew about VHS they certainly wouldn't know about Beta technology. That would be ancient!

It's a wonder that some expressions last given how fast things change. Yet, it would seem some sayings do endure over time and continue to be used regardless if their origin is understood or not today. I would like to explore this further in future newsletters. If anyone thinks of an expression that has a noteworthy origin I would love to hear about it; "straight from the horses mouth" if you know what I mean? This could be fun. FRASER MANDERS

May 23,1924—September 15,2012

Fraser Charles Manders, retired Secondary School Principal of the Peel Board of Education, had a very important connection to The Old Britannia Schoolhouse.

In 1959, the Britannia School Township closed along with many other one-room schoolhouses across Ontario. The school then sat empty awaiting a new use ---or simply decay. One day in late summer of 1970, Fraser was driving along Highway # 10 and noticed that the old Britannia School stood empty and was badly deteriorated. At the time, Fraser Manders was the Principal of Streetsville Secondary School and he decided to take action. On September 17, 1970, Fraser sent a memo to Maurice Cowie, Head of History at Streetsville Secondary School outlining some ideas for teaching opportunities. The Friends of the Schoolhouse still have this original memo. I will quote directly from

of the Schoolhouse still have this original Fraser's memo:

"I notice that the old Britannia School on Highway # 10 is all boarded up.Is there any place here to approach the Board..... to have a few selected students do a study of 19th century schools and education, and of this school in particular; and then to try to restore this school and to furnish it as it would have appeared in its heyday? This would certainly be a big undertaking: do you think it is feasible? Do you think it is worthwhile?"

Maurice Cowie must have agreed that Fraser's idea was worthwhile. The History Department took a leadership role and the Britannia Restoration Club came into being. A number of dedicated teachers and students worked diligently on repairs and restoration activities throughout the '70's decade. Financing was a challenge but money was raised through a Wintario Grant and donations from local service clubs and businesses. As a staff member of Streetsville Secondary School in those years, I have many memories of that era---and year-books with photos of the progress made by The Britannia Restoration Club.

Even though considerable work and fundraising was done by this group, it was realized that the project was beyond the means of this school club. The Peel Board of Education took over and completed the restoration in 1982. The schoolhouse was restored to be a 'living history' site where elementary and secondary classes from across Peel could visit for a day and participate in lessons of 'long ago' taught by a schoolmistress or schoolmaster.

Fraser Manders passed away September 15th and the Celebration of Life was held at Applewood United Church on October 13, 2012. It seems appropriate, at this time, to remember and honour his vision and actions taken for The Old Britannia Schoolhouse.

Even after his retirement, Fraser continued to take an interest in the schoolhouse. Along with his wife, Ruth, Fraser attended our Arbour Day Celebration on May 2, 2008. In January of 2010, Fraser arranged for Eva Ardiel and Joan Reid to make a presentation to the Streetsville Rotary Club about The Old Britannia Schoolhouse and its programme.

All the Friends of the Schoolhouse and those associated with The Old Britannia Schoolhouse are thankful for Fraser's vision and the work he began.
