## Friends Attend the S.L.A.T.E. Conference in Childs, New York

This year's S.L.A.T.E. Conference (So Let's All Talk Education ...in a one room schoolhouse) was held at The Cobblestone Museum situated between Niagara Falls and Rochester, NY, on Monday, April 19<sup>th</sup>. This was only the second time that S.L.A.T.E. has been held in the US. Britannia Schoolhouse Friends attending the Conference were Eva Ardiel, Joan Reid, Schoolmaster Dennis Patterson, Ruth and Dennis Taylor, Cathy Harper, Earl Bonner, Frances Kay, Karen Simmons, Sandra Emerson, Lis Braun, Shirley Hoad and Jean Robinson. This was the first conference in quite a few years that the weather was sunny and bright instead of the usual rain and drizzle!

The Cobblestone Society was organized in 1960 to acquire and preserve the rapidly deteriorating 1834 Cobblestone Church and to amass and disseminate information on this early 19<sup>th</sup> century building style. Cobblestone masonry was a construction method in which beach stones, or cobbles, were laid in horizontal rows and set in projecting, decorative soft lime mortar. This type of masonry construction originated in New York State between the period of the building of the Erie Canal and 1860, the Civil War Period. 90% of the over 1200 buildings of this type in North America can be found within a 200 kilometer radius of Rochester, NY.

The Museum consists of eight buildings, the Universalist Church, the School, Parsonage House, Farmers' Hall, Harness Shop, Blacksmith Shop, a Print Shop, and a brick house. After a welcome and a brief history of the founding of the museum, we toured the buildings in small groups, with special attention being paid to the Cobblestone Schoolhouse with its unique sloping floor. After this all too brief look at the buildings we returned to the church for a very informative talk on the One Room School Houses of Orleans County by Alice Zacker, an historian from Shelby, NY. Alice has written a book entitled "Slate Board and Hot Soup" about her research. She had much anecdotal information from former teachers of one room schoolhouses in her area to share with us. It is always interesting to learn of the similarities and differences of early education in the United States and Canada at the same time period.

Eva conducted a brief business meeting in which the hitherto loose structure of S.L.A.T.E was given a more formal appearance with the adoption of a Constitution. It was gratifying to learn that sites for the conference in 2011 and 2012 were secured. The 2010 Conference will be held in the Black Schoolhouse in Buxton, Ontario and the 2012 S.L.A.T.E. will be at Quinte in Prince Edward County, Ontario.

After a delicious lunch at the Village Inn, we returned to the church for a talk by Dr. Jeffrey Liles on "Educating the Educator", a history of teacher training from the mid 1600's to 1965 in the USA. In the early days of organized schools most "teachers" had no formal training and no education past the eighth grade. By the 1920's and 30's Normal School training became mandatory and later University degrees were required to become a teacher. By this time the One Room Schoolhouses on both sides of the border had been closed. Teacher training has certainly changed in 400 years!

Thanks to Eva who has been in SLATE since the beginning, we can learn from and enjoy meeting similar kindred spirits who strive to keep the One Room Schoolhouses alive.

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#### Dandelion Wine

This recipe is from a Five Roses Flour Cookbook (date unknown)

Fresh dandelion petals are required for the wine. Pick the petals from flowers, to make 1 gallon. Place them in a vessel and pour over 1 gallon of boiling water. Cover, let stand 12 days, stirring occasionally. Strain off the liquid, pour it into a preserving pan, add 3 ½ pounds of sugar and the thinly shaved rind and the juice of 1 orange and 1 lemon. If desired, add a little whole ginger root. Boil gently for 20 minutes. Let stand until lukewarm. Spread \( \frac{1}{4} \) ounce of yeast on a piece of toast and lay this on top of the liquid. Cover and let stand for 2 days. Strain, put wine into a cask, bung down and leave for 2 months. Then bottle and keep for at least 6 months before using.

Chop 1 carrot, 1 potato, 1 stalk of celery and add to 3 cups of vegetable stock. Bring to a boil then simmer gently until veggies are tender. Enjoy!
