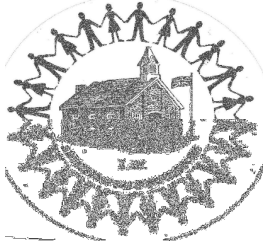

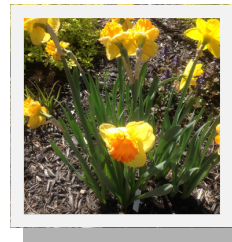

Just when the spring bulbs were popping out of the ground, they disappeared under that white stuff. We were eager to see the tulips and snowdrops that we planted last fall around Ben's Corner. Certainly the daffodils which are located in many places have shown their bright yellow heads. The tulips that were donated by Vesey's Bulb company are blooming now, and are beautiful.



Our plans for the gardens this season are underway. Volunteer Saturday mornings for students were planned for April 23 and May 7 and 14. Anyone is welcome to join us, though we do the weekend times to enable students to earn volunteer hours. Sometimes their parents help too. We have a few adult volunteers who come willingly when we call on them. After the clean up, we have some areas that were cleared last fall, and now need to be replanted. That's the fun part of working in the gardens. Weeding is always ongoing, but not really enjoyable.



The gardens are usually showing the most colour in June and July, when many perennial varieties are at peak bloom, including about 40 rose bushes. Visitors are welcome to wander through the several pathways which lead into the back parts of the Victorian Cottage Garden. We do ask that you admire, but not pick!

We all feel very strongly about helping to preserve this amazing schoolhouse and the programs delivered by our schoolmaster and schoolmistress. I know our new chair, Karen Simmons, is also looking forward to her new position. So here are a few highlights for me. We have volunteers who give their time each month for Open Sunday. This allows the general public an opportunity to come into the schoolhouse. You can read a bit more about this in the article 'Open Sundays' in this newsletter.

Our Garden Committee members are already busy in our beautiful Victorian Gardens checking to see what flowers are starting to bloom, what raking and tidying needs to be done, what needs to be pruned and trimmed and if any new heritage plants are required. This is also the second year for Ben's Corner, our new conversation area in the garden. Hopefully, all of those plants have survived the winter. I have also been busy with five other members working on a research book about the one room schoolhouses in Peel. For the past three years we have been carrying on the work that Joan Reid had started. We have researched documents at PAMA (Peel Art Gallery, Museum and Archives), tried to solve a few mysteries, spoken to former teachers and students, travelled about the county trying to find the location of one room schoolhouses, taking photos of these locations as well as speaking to those fortunate enough to be living in some of the restored schoolhouses. At times it seemed the more we found out, the more we needed to learn. But, we are now in the process of publishing our findings and can't wait to see the finished book! We look forward to having these books for sale at our various events.

Each year a number of us attend the S.L.A.T.E. conference for those involved with one room schoolhouses. This year it was held in Ingersoll and Shirley Hoad has written an excellent summary further in the newsletter. We are excited about hosting this conference next year and have already started working on our activities, speakers and workshops.

At last December's Open Sunday and Sale we tried something a bit different. We invited several vendors to display their wares alongside our own wooden toys, books, note cards, and crafts. Everyone was very pleased with the wool, wool items, barn board furniture and decorative items as well as the honey these new vendors had for sale. We will certainly be continuing this idea. We also showcase our schoolhouse and its history in Brampton Heritage every February and the Brampton Fall Fair each September. Children and adults are always fascinated with our wooden toys-no batteries or electricity required. It is fun, too, to see what awards our Schoolmistress, Schoolmaster and various classes have earned at the Fall fair for their vegetables grown in our schoolhouse gardens. Another event in September is Doors Open when again we welcome visitors into the schoolhouse. Every June we host the famous Strawberry Social in the Atrium at the CBO. 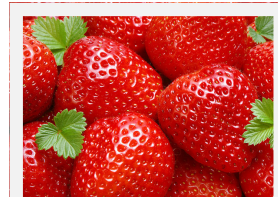

Our own research while cre- ating this program has lead us to many interesting discoveries. We've been to the cemetery of Britannia United (formerly Methodist) Church up the road, built in 1843, 9 years before the Schoolhouse, and have seen familiar names, some which can be traced back almost 2 centuries. Several appear on the backs of class photos of former pupils on display in the Schoolhouse.

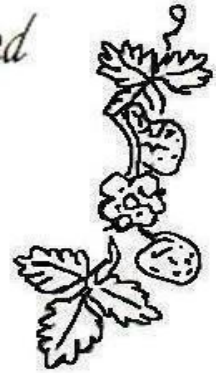
We have also been to the Peel archives in Brampton (PAMA) and had the opportunity to deepen our research using the incredible resources there. Resources housed at the Schoolhouse proved invaluable as well.

Each discovery we made served to add another piece to a historic puzzle and another layer to a community's story. And this is precisely what we hope to offer the students who visit the Schoolhouse. By examining seemingly, at first, unrelated pieces of information and artefacts, students will have the opportunity to hone their powers of deduction and reasoning and make inferences that will allow them to draw connections and conclusions. Putting together pieces of the themed "puzzles" we hope will illicit in student researchers the same sort of emotional responses and "aha moments" that we ourselves experienced. Feeling a connection with the former residents of Britannia and understanding that their stories were real can only lead to a broader understanding of life in Canada in the past and the present.

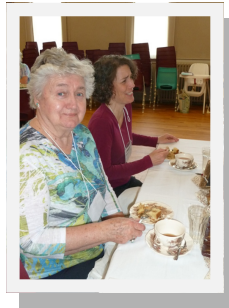

Very often our visitors tell us how much our schoolroom reminds them of the schools they attended in their home country before they arrived in Canada. The old wooden desks and other artifacts evoke many fond memories for them. Some of our special visitors are Grade Three students who have recently visited the schoolhouse with their class. Having excitedly told their parents about their day, they can't wait to show their families the slates, the dunce cap or even the stilts and other early toys and games. In March we had a Grade Three teacher who hadn't been able to book a visit for her class. So she told her students about our Open Sunday and a number of her students came with their families. We thought that was wonderful. We had over 40 visitors that day which we think is a record for Open Sunday.
